Voting Instructions – Paper Ballot



Mark your ballot

Use a pen with blue or black ink to fill in the oval to the left of the candidate's name you wish to vote for. Do not use red ink, pencil, or Sharpie.



To mark your choice, fill in the oval completely.

Voting for more than allowed for a contest will be an over vote and no votes for that contest will be counted. The rest of the ballot will count.

Do not sign your name, write your initials, or write any other words/marks on your voted ballot.



To vote for a **qualified** write-in candidate, write their name in the blank space at the end of the list of candidates. Only qualified write-in candidate votes will be counted. A list of qualified write-in candidates is available by phone, at polling places, or online at www.suttercounty.org/elections.

Cast your ballot

Place your voted ballot inside the blue return envelope. Sign your name, write your residence address in the spaces provided, and seal.

Dropping your ballot at any secure ballot drop box, or:



Visiting any polling place on Election Day before 8:00 pm.

Vote in person

To vote a ballot at the polls, visit your polling place [noted on your vote by mail envelope](#) located under your name and request a ballot from the poll worker.



A facsimile ballot in the following languages will be available at all polling places: Spanish, Punjabi and Tagalog.

You may bring up to two individuals with you to your polling place to help you cast your ballot, as long as those individuals do not represent your employer or your union.

Occupation: Farmer, Member of the U.S. House of Representatives

Education and Qualifications: The last several years have been difficult for too many of our North State neighbors. Inflation has taken a bite out of family budgets, gas and energy prices have soared, and outside crime and lawlessness have increased in our rural towns. The regulatory challenges we face in Northern California just keep growing.

FULL TEXT OF BOND MEASURE C

BOND AUTHORIZATION

By approval of this measure by at least 55% of the registered voters voting on the measure, the Sutter Union High School District (the "District") will be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$13,800,000 in aggregate principal amount, at interest rates not to exceed legal limits and to provide financing for the specific types of school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List included below, subject to all the accountability requirements specified below.

ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS

The provisions in this section are specifically included in this measure in order that the voters and taxpayers in the District may be assured that their money will be spent wisely. Expenditures to address specific facilities needs of the District will be in compliance with the requirements of Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), of the State Constitution and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Education Code Sections 15264 and following.)

The Bonds may be issued under the provisions of the California Education Code (starting at Section 15100), under the provisions of the California Government Code (starting at Section 53506), or under any other provision of law authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds by school districts. The Bonds may be issued in series by the District, from time to time, and each series of Bonds shall mature within the legal limitations set forth in the applicable law under which the Bonds are issued.

Evaluation of Needs. The Governing Board of the District (the "Board") has identified detailed facilities needs of the District, and has determined which projects to finance from a local bond. The Board hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction, enrollment growth, and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List described below.

Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee. Following approval of this measure, the Board will establish an independent citizens' oversight committee, under Education Code Sections 15278 and following, to ensure bond proceeds are expended only on the types of school facilities projects listed below. The committee will be established within 60 days of the date when the results of the election appear in the minutes of the Board.

Performance Audits. The Board will conduct annual, independent performance audits to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects listed below.

Financial Audits. The Board will conduct annual, independent financial audits of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects listed below.

Government Code Accountability Requirements. As required by Section 53410 of the Government Code, (1) the specific purpose of the bonds is set forth in this Full Text of the Measure, (2) the proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be used only for the purposes specified in this measure,



and not for any other purpose, (3) the proceeds of the bonds, when and if issued, will be deposited into a building fund to be held by the Sutter County Treasurer, as required by the Education Code, and (4) the Superintendent of the District shall cause an annual report to be filed with the Board of the District not later than January 1 of each year, which report shall contain pertinent information regarding the amount of funds collected and expended, as well as the status of the projects listed in this measure, as required by Sections 53410 and 53411 of the Government Code.

NO TEACHER OR ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES

Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this measure shall be used only for the purposes specified in Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), specifically the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and the acquisition or lease of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

STATE MATCHING FUNDS

The following statement is included in this measure pursuant to Education Code Section 15122.5: Approval of this measure does not guarantee that the proposed projects that are the subject of bonds under this measure will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by this measure. The District's proposal for the projects described below may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which, if available, could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure.

INFORMATION ABOUT ESTIMATES AND PROJECTIONS INCLUDED IN BALLOT

Voters are informed that any estimates or projections in the bond measure or ballot materials, including relating to estimated tax rates, the duration of issued bonds and related tax levies and collections are provided as informational only. Such amounts are estimates and are not maximum amounts or limitations on the terms of the bonds, the tax rate or duration of the tax supporting repayment of issued bonds. Such estimates depend on numerous variables which are subject to variation and change over the term of the District's overall facilities and bond financing plan, including but not limited to the amount of bonds issued and outstanding at any one time, the interest rates applicable to issued bonds, market conditions at the time of sale of the bonds, when bonds mature, timing of project needs and changes in assessed valuations in the District. As such, while such estimates and approximations are provided based on information currently available to the District and its current expectations, such estimates and approximations are not limitations and are not binding upon the District. In addition, the abbreviated and condensed statement of the bond measure presented to voters which is subject to a word count limitation imposed by State law does not limit the scope and complete meaning of the measure provided in this Full Text of Bond Measure and related ballot materials.

BOND PROJECT LIST

Scope of Projects. Bond proceeds will be expended on the modernization, renovation, expansion, acquisition, construction/reconstruction, rehabilitation, and/or replacement of school facilities of the District, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, at all current and future sites and properties.

School Facility Project List. The items presented on the following list provide the types of school facilities projects authorized to be financed with voter-approved bond proceeds. Specific examples included on this list are not intended to limit the types of projects described and authorized by this



measure. The following types of projects are authorized at all existing sites of the District and all sites that may be acquired by the District in the future:

- Modernize the football stadium including new bleachers, playing surface, all-weather track and restrooms.
- Improve all athletic facilities including softball/baseball dugouts and bleachers.
- Make health, safety and handicapped accessibility improvements.
- Rebuild tennis courts; upgrade physical education fields and facilities for school and community use.
- Repair, replace and/or upgrade surfaces including parking, turf, fields, and other grounds.
- Address unforeseen conditions revealed by construction/modernization (such as plumbing or gas line breaks, dry rot, seismic, structural, etc.).
- Pave stadium parking and access road to stadium.
- Abate and remove hazardous materials identified prior or during construction.
- Other improvements required to comply with existing building codes, including the Field Act, and handicapped access requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- All work necessary and incidental to specific projects described above, including demolition of existing structures.

Incidental Expenses. Each of the bond projects described in this Bond Project List include the costs of furnishing and equipping such facilities, and all costs which are incidental but directly related to the types of projects described above. Examples of incidental costs include, but are not limited to: costs of design, engineering, architect and other professional services, facilities assessments, inspections, site preparation, utilities, landscaping, painting, bond project construction management, administration and other planning and permitting, legal, accounting and similar costs; independent annual financial and performance audits; a customary construction contingency; abatement, demolition and disposal of existing structures; the costs of interim housing and storage during construction including relocation and construction costs incurred relating to interim facilities; the preparation or restoration of construction, renovation or remodeling; rental or construction of storage facilities and other space on an interim basis for materials and other equipment and furnishings displaced during construction; costs of relocating facilities and equipment as needed in connection with the projects; interim classrooms and facilities for students, administrators, and school functions, including modular facilities; federal and state-mandated safety upgrades; addressing unforeseen conditions revealed by construction/modernization and other necessary improvements required to comply with existing building codes, including the Field Act; access requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act; and costs of the election; bond issuance costs; and project administration during the duration of such projects, as permitted by law.



Furnishing and Equipping. Each project is assumed to include its share of furniture, fixtures, equipment, architectural, engineering, and similar planning costs, program/project management, staff training expenses and a customary contingency for unforeseen design and construction costs. In addition to the listed projects stated above, the list also includes the acquisition of a variety of instructional, maintenance and operational equipment, including the reduction or retirement of outstanding lease obligations and interim funding incurred to advance fund projects from the list; installation of signage and fencing; payment of the costs of preparation of all facility planning, facility studies, assessment reviews, facility master plan preparation and updates, environmental studies (including environmental investigation, remediation and monitoring), design and construction documentation, and temporary housing of dislocated District activities caused by construction projects. The upgrading of technology infrastructure includes, but is not limited to, computers, projectors, portable interface devices, servers, switches, routers, modules, sound projection systems, printers, digital white boards, document projectors, telephone system, call manager and network security/firewall, wireless technology systems and other miscellaneous equipment.

Alterations to Scope; Acquisition of Real Property. The scope and nature of any of the specific projects described above may be altered by the District as required by conditions that may arise during the course of design and construction. In the event that a modernization or renovation project is more economical for or otherwise determined by the Board to be in the best interests of the District to be undertaken as new construction, this bond measure authorizes said new construction including land acquisition, relocation and construction at a new or alternative site, and/or demolition and reconstruction and/or repurposing on the original site, including an expanded site, and all costs relating thereto. For any project involving rehabilitation or renovation of a building or the major portion of a building, the District shall be authorized to proceed with new construction instead, if the Board determines that replacement and new construction is more economically practical than rehabilitation and renovation, considering the building's age, condition, expected remaining life, and other relevant factors.

In addition, this measure authorizes the acquisition of real property, including necessary rights of ways or other real property interests required to expand District facilities, to provide access to school or other District facilities, or to provide additional school or related facilities.

Interim Financing Included; Joint Use Projects Authorized. Authorized projects include paying and/or prepaying interim or previously obtained financing for the types of projects included on the Bond Project List, such as bond anticipation notes, and includes prepayment of lease payments to acquire title to facilities and/or equipment previously financed. Projects may also be undertaken on a joint use basis with other public entities.

Bond Project List Not in Order of Priority; Board Determines Prioritization. Approval of this bond measure does not guarantee that the proposed projects will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by the measure. The District's capital needs currently exceed the amount of bonds the voters are being asked to authorize. The order in which particular projects are listed is not intended to suggest priority for funding or completion, and itemization of projects in the list above does not guarantee that all such projects will be undertaken. Project priorities will be determined by the Board. The ability of the District to undertake and complete the listed projects is subject to numerous variables including the adequacy and availability of sufficient funding sources. The District is unable to anticipate all unforeseen circumstances which may prevent some of the projects listed above from being undertaken or completed.

Interpretation. The terms of this bond measure and the words used in the Bond Project List shall be interpreted broadly to effect the purpose of providing broad and clear authority for the officers and



employees of the District to provide for the school facilities projects the District proposes to finance with the proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition within the authority provided by law, including Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution, Education Code Section 15000 *et seq.* and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000. Words used in the Bond Project List such as repair, improve, upgrade, expand, modernize, renovate, and reconfigure are used to describe school facilities projects in plain English but are not intended to expand the nature of such projects beyond what is authorized by law. As such, in accordance with legal requirements, the Bond Project List does not authorize, and shall not be interpreted to authorize, expending proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition for current maintenance, operation or repairs.

Severability. The Board hereby declares, and the voters by approving this Bond Measure concur, that every section and part of this bond proposition has independent value, and the Board and the voters would have adopted each provision hereof regardless of every other provision hereof. Upon approval of this measure by the voters, should any part be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason, all remaining parts hereof shall remain in full force and effect to the fullest extent allowed by law, and to this end the provisions of this bond measure are severable.

ABBREVIATED FORM OF BOND MEASURE

To modernize district's athletic stadium including football field, track, bleachers, restrooms, snack bar and paved parking; rebuild unstable tennis/pickleball courts; shall the Sutter Union High School District measure authorizing \$13,800,000 of bonds at legal rates be adopted, generating approximately \$840,000 annually while bonds are outstanding at average rates of approximately \$25 per \$100,000 assessed value, with annual audits, independent citizens' oversight, NO money for salaries and all money staying local?



TAX RATE STATEMENT

An election will be held in the Sutter Union High School District (the "District") on November 5, 2024, to authorize the sale of up to \$13,800,000 in general obligation bonds. The following information is submitted in compliance with Sections 9400-9404 of the Elections Code of the State of California. Such information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District, and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the District's assessed valuation, the following information is provided:

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$25 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. It is currently expected that the tax will be collected until fiscal year 2058-59.

2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate that would be required to fund this bond issue, based on estimated assessed valuations available at the time of filing this statement, is \$25 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation. This rate is projected to apply beginning in each fiscal year that bonds are outstanding.

3. The best estimate of total debt service, including principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold will be approximately \$29,398,702.

These estimates are based on projections derived from information obtained from official sources, and are based on the assessed value (not market value) of taxable property on the County's official tax rolls. In addition, taxpayers eligible for a property tax exemption, such as the homeowner's exemption, will be taxed at a lower effective tax rate than described above. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions. The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only, which amounts are not maximum amounts and durations and are not binding upon the District. The actual debt service, tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary depending on the timing of bond sales, the par amount of bonds sold at each sale and actual increases in assessed valuations. The timing of the bond sales and the amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for project funds and other considerations. Actual assessed valuations will depend upon the amount and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the County Assessor in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

**IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS BY THE SUTTER COUNTY COUNSEL RELATING TO BOND
MEASURE C WHICH SEEKS APPROVAL TO ISSUE AND SELL BONDS BY THE
SUTTER UNION HIGH SCHOOL DISTRICT**

This measure was placed on the ballot by the Governing Board (Board) of the Sutter Union High School District (District). A “yes” vote is a vote to authorize bonds. A “no” vote is a vote against issuing the proposed bonds.

If affirmed by 55% of the electorate in the District, Measure C will authorize the issuance of new general obligation bonds in the maximum principal amount of \$13,800,000. Bond proceeds may be used to fund the types of projects included on the Bond Project List as set forth in the bond measure. Bond proceeds may be expended on the modernization, renovation, expansion, acquisition, construction, furnishing, equipping, rehabilitation, or replacement of the District’s school facilities. Authorized projects include but are not limited to improving all athletic facilities such as the football stadium, baseball dugouts and bleachers, tennis courts, parking, turf, fields, and other grounds.

Projects may be undertaken at all current and future District sites and properties, and on a joint use basis with other public entities. Bond proceeds may also be used for incidental expenses such as design and planning costs, construction management, inspections and administration, legal and accounting costs, and unforeseen conditions discovered as projects are undertaken. Proceeds of the bonds may not be used for any teachers’ or administrative salaries or other school operating expenses.

The Board has certified that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction, enrollment growth, and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List. If this bond measure is approved, the Board will establish and appoint members to an independent citizens’ oversight committee to actively review and report to the public whether bond proceeds are used as authorized. The Board will also conduct annual, independent performance and financial audits to ensure that bond proceeds have been expended only on the types of projects described in the measure.

Approval of this bond measure does not guarantee that the proposed projects will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by the bond measure. The District’s capital needs currently exceed the amount of bonds the voters are being asked to authorize. The District’s proposals for the projects may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure, and therefore passage of the bond measure is not a guarantee that any projects will be completed.

Measure C will not otherwise affect existing law. This analysis is submitted by the Sutter County Counsel as required under Elections Code section 9500.

CITY OF YUBA CITY MEASURE D

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS

On July 16, 2024, the City Council unanimously voted to place Measure D, on the November 5th, 2024 statewide general election ballot. Measure D adds Title 3, Chapter 6 to the Yuba City Municipal Code, adopting a one percent (1%) annual transaction and use tax on tangible personal property transactions (“sales tax”) until ended by voters.

State law allows the governing body of a city to adopt a transaction and use tax if approved by the majority of city-resident voters by election (RTC § 7285.9). This Measure adopts the one percent tax (1%) upon retailers’ gross receipts from the sale, use and storage of most tangible personal property sold within the City. Delivery charges are also subject to the sales tax as provided by state law.

The Current sales tax rate levied within the City is 7.25%. If Measure D is approved, the new sales tax rate will be 8.25%. The measure will generate approximately \$17,500,000 annually for the general fund.

As a “general tax,” Measure D would provide more revenue for the City’s general fund, where the City would pay for any lawful City program, improvement, or service, including, but not limited to:

- road repairs;
- police and fire services;
- addressing homelessness; and
- funding general fund services and essential activity

As currently, food purchased as groceries, prescription medication, medical and dental services, real estate, rent, utilities, education, personal services and labor will not be taxed. The specific retail sales and uses subject to the tax would be determined under California Department of Tax and Fee Administration (“CDTFA”) regulations and applicable law. The tax would be administered by the CDTFA under contract with the City of Yuba City. The ordinance provides provisions for independent audits, and appointment of a citizens’ oversight committee.

Any additional increase to the sales tax rate must be approved by the voters. The sales tax proposed by Measure D would take effect only if it receives a majority “YES” vote (50% plus 1) at the November 5, 2024, state general election.

A “**Yes**” vote means you approve the 1% sales tax for general fund uses.

A “**No**” vote means you oppose the 1% sales tax for general fund uses.

BOND AUTHORIZATION

By approval of this measure by at least 55 percent of the registered voters voting on the measure, the Woodland Joint Unified School District will be authorized to issue and sell bonds of up to \$160,000,000 in aggregate principal amount at interest rates not to exceed legal limits and to provide financing for the specific types of school facilities projects listed in the Bond Project List described below, subject to all the accountability requirements specified below.

ACCOUNTABILITY REQUIREMENTS

The provisions in this section are specifically included in this measure in order that the voters and taxpayers in the District may be assured that their money will be spent wisely. Expenditures to address specific facilities needs of the District will be in compliance with the requirements of Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), of the State Constitution and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000 (codified at Education Code Sections 15264 and following.)

Evaluation of Needs. The Board of Trustees of the District (the "School Board") has identified detailed facilities needs of the District and has determined which projects to finance from a local bond. The School Board hereby certifies that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction, enrollment growth, and information technology needs in developing the Bond Project List shown below.

Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee. Following approval of this measure, the Board of Trustees will establish an Independent Citizens' Oversight Committee, under Education Code Sections 15278 and following, to ensure bond proceeds are expended only on the types of school facilities projects listed below. The committee will be established within 60 days of the date when the results of the election appear in the minutes of the School Board.

Performance Audits. The School Board will conduct annual, independent performance audits to ensure that the bond proceeds have been expended only on the school facilities projects listed below.

Financial Audits. The School Board will conduct annual, independent financial audits of the bond proceeds until all of those proceeds have been spent for the school facilities projects listed below.

Government Code Accountability Requirements. As required by Section 53410 of the Government Code, (1) the specific purpose of the bonds is set forth in this Full Text of the Measure, (2) the proceeds from the sale of the bonds will be used only for the purposes specified in this measure, and not for any other purpose, (3) the proceeds of the bonds, when and if issued, will be deposited into a building fund to be held by the Yolo County Treasurer, as required by the California Education Code, and (4) the Superintendent of the District shall cause an annual report to be filed with the Board of Trustees of the District not later than January 1 of each year, which report shall contain pertinent information regarding the amount of funds collected and expended, as well as the status of the projects listed in this measure, as required by Sections 53410 and 53411 of the Government Code.



NO TEACHER OR ADMINISTRATOR SALARIES

Proceeds from the sale of bonds authorized by this measure shall be used only for the purposes specified in Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3), those being for the construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, and the acquisition or lease of school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries and other school operating expenses.

STATE MATCHING FUNDS

The following statement is included in this measure pursuant to Education Code Section 15122.5: Approval of this measure does not guarantee that the proposed project or projects that are the subject of bonds under this measure will be funded beyond the local revenues generated by this measure. The list of projects set forth herein may assume the receipt of matching state funds, which, if available, could be subject to appropriation by the Legislature or approval of a statewide bond measure.

INFORMATION ABOUT ESTIMATES AND PROJECTIONS INCLUDED IN BALLOT

Voters are informed that any estimates or projections in this bond measure and related ballot materials, including relating to estimated rates of ad valorem property taxes, the duration of issued bonds and related levies and collections of ad valorem property taxes are provided as informational only. Such amounts are estimates and are not maximum amounts or limitations on the terms of the bonds, the tax rate or the duration of the levy supporting repayment of issued bonds. Such estimates depend on numerous variables which are subject to variation and change over the term of the District's overall facilities and bond financing plan, including but not limited to the amount of bonds issued and outstanding at any one time, the interest rates applicable to issued bonds, market conditions at the time of sale of the bonds, when bonds mature, timing of project needs and changes in assessed valuations in the District. As such, while such estimates and approximations are provided based on information currently available to the District and its current expectations, such estimates and approximations are not limitations and are not binding upon the District.

In addition, the abbreviated and condensed statement of the bond measure presented to voters on the ballot label which is subject to a word count limitation imposed by State law does not limit the broader scope and complete meaning of the measure provided in this Full Text of Bond Measure and related bond election resolution and tax rate statement.

BOND PROJECT LIST

Scope of Projects. Bond proceeds will be expended on the construction, modernization, reconstruction, rehabilitation, replacement, equipping, furnishing or otherwise improvement of school facilities of the Woodland Joint Unified School District. Additionally, funds may be utilized for the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities, and not for any other purpose, including teacher and administrator salaries or other school operating expenses, in compliance with California Constitution Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3). This measure authorizes bond projects to be undertaken at all current and future District sites.

School Facility Project List. The items presented on the following list provide are the types of projects authorized to be financed with the proceeds of Bonds approved by this measure. Examples included



on this list are not intended to limit the broader types of projects described and authorized by this measure. The types of projects authorized are:

- Expand, renovate and revitalize existing or construct new classrooms and school facilities for Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math (“STEAM”) instruction
- Replace, repair, modernize deteriorating roofs, leaking pipes and gutters, downspouts, outdated plumbing, sewer and gas lines, waterlines, storm drains and valves, heating, cooling, ventilation systems and electrical systems
- Renovate and modernize classrooms and school facilities including ceilings, flooring, windows, window coverings, doors, lighting, interior and exterior finishes, and paint
- Renovate, repair, replace, construct and/or install playfields, playgrounds, playground equipment, outdoor learning spaces, running track improvements, other physical education and athletic facilities, and all related improvements and equipment and spectator amenities and seating
- Develop, construct, install and improve outdoor areas including, outdoor learning and eating areas, hardscaping, landscaping, turf and the planting of trees, irrigation improvements, and building/installing shade structures and seating
- Renovate and repair restrooms
- Expand, upgrade and renovate existing classrooms and school facilities for vocational education programs, trade skills and life skills programs such as welding and automotive technology, culinary arts, medical and health technology, and construction trades
- Repair, modernize outdated portable classrooms or replace with permanent modern facilities
- Upgrade, install, expand district-wide technology projects including computers, tablets, peripheral hardware, classroom technology tools, data backup systems, remote learning software, internet, wi-fi, network connections and hardware
- Renovate, expand and modernize libraries, classroom, workroom, office and conference room spaces generally including for mental health, wellness, counseling, and nursing
- Provide adequate furniture and equipment for all classrooms
- Acquire, install and/or upgrade campus safety and security, including keyless entry, intrusion alarms, security cameras, intercom and emergency communications systems, lighting systems, bell systems, fire and life safety systems, fencing and gates, pedestrian access, walkways, lighting, reconfiguring entrances and drop-off/pickup locations, point of entry access, upgrading door locks and other security-related systems
- Repair or replace deteriorating asphalt, concrete, sidewalks, parking lots, driveways and walkways
- Construct, modernize, retrofit cafeteria, kitchen, food service facilities, auditorium and multipurpose rooms
- School construction
- Improve energy efficiency and sustainability including installation of energy efficient lighting and systems, solar panels, battery storage, and electric vehicle charging stations



- Make health and safety improvements, such as installing necessary seismic reinforcements, and repairing and/or replacing aging building materials including removal of hazardous materials identified either prior to or during construction
- Federal and State-mandated Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility upgrades district-wide, including site access, walkways, upgraded and new parking, staff and student restrooms, relocation of some existing electrical devices, drinking fountains, playground equipment and classrooms

Furnishing and Equipping/Incidental Costs Authorized. Each of the bond projects described in this Bond Project List include the costs of furnishing and equipping such facilities, and all costs which are incidental but directly related to the types of projects described above.

Examples of incidental costs include, but are not limited to: costs of design, engineering, architect and other professional services, costs of preliminary planning and feasibility and facilities needs assessments, inspections, site preparation, utilities, landscaping, construction management and other planning and permitting, legal (including relating to potential or actual litigation), accounting and similar costs; independent annual financial and performance audits; a customary construction contingency; demolition and disposal of existing structures; the costs of interim housing and storage during construction including relocation and construction costs incurred relating to interim facilities; rental or construction of storage facilities and other space on an interim basis for materials and other equipment and furnishings displaced during construction; costs of relocating facilities and equipment as needed in connection with the projects; interim classrooms and facilities for students, administrators, and school functions, including modular facilities; federal and state-mandated safety upgrades; addressing unforeseen conditions revealed by construction/modernization and other necessary improvements required to comply with existing building codes, including the Field Act; access requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act; costs of the election including of legal counsel; project construction oversight, management and administration during the duration of such projects, including by District personnel, and bond issuance costs.

Changes in Scope: New Construction. The scope and nature of any of the specific projects described above may be altered by the District as required by conditions that may arise during the course of design and construction or based on discoveries or other factors that the District Board determines are sufficiently important to adjust the scope and nature of the projects. Furthermore, the District Board may determine that a project identified above as modernization or renovation may be undertaken as new construction if it is more economical for the District or if the Board determines that there are other compelling factors that result in new construction being in the best interests of the District and its students. The authority for new construction extends to land acquisition, relocation, expansion and construction and/or reconstruction, similar purchases, and all costs relating thereto. In addition, this measure authorizes the acquisition of real property, including necessary rights of ways or other real property interests, required to expand District facilities, to provide access to school or other District facilities, or to provide additional school or related facilities. Each of the foregoing sentences has independent value and is not conditioned on any of the other sentences in this section.

Factors Impacting Project Implementation: No Guarantee All Projects Addressed. Many factors which the District cannot predict or control may impact its ability to address each of the projects, including but not limited to construction cost issues, supply chain issues which can cause project delays, labor shortages, and unknown environmental factors or site conditions, among others. The District is unable to anticipate all circumstances which may prevent some of the projects listed above from being undertaken or completed. Approval of this bond measure does not guarantee that all of the projects on



the Bond Project List will be funded beyond what can be completed with funds generated by this bond measure. As stated below, the Board is vested with the authority to identify project prioritization within the scope of available funding sources.

Interim Financing Included. Authorized projects include reimbursements for project costs previously paid by the District, and paying and/or prepaying interim or previously obtained financing for the types of projects included on the project list, such as bond anticipation notes or lease financings including certificates of participation relating to facilities projects and/or equipment previously financed.

Joint Use Projects Authorized. Projects on this list may be undertaken and used as joint use projects with other public agencies.

Project List Not in Order of Priority; Board Determines Prioritization. The order in which projects are listed in the foregoing Bond Project List does not suggest an order of priority. Project prioritization is vested in and will be determined by the District Board.

Interpretation. The terms of this Bond Measure and the words used in the Bond Project List shall be interpreted broadly to effect the purpose of providing broad and clear authority for the officers and employees of the District to provide for the school facilities projects the District proposes to finance with the proceeds of the sale of bonds authorized by this proposition within the authority provided by law, including Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3) of the California Constitution, Education Code Section 15000 et seq. and the Strict Accountability in Local School Construction Bonds Act of 2000. Words used in the Project List such as repair, improve, upgrade, expand, modernize, renovate, and reconfigure are used to describe school facilities projects in plain English but are not intended to expand the nature of such projects beyond what is authorized by law.

Severability. The District Board hereby declares, and the voters by approving this Bond Measure concur, that every section and part of this bond proposition has independent value, and the District Board and the voters would have adopted each provision hereof regardless of every other provision hereof. Upon approval of this measure by the voters, should any part be found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid for any reason, all remaining parts hereof shall remain in full force and effect to the fullest extent allowed by law, and to this end the provisions of this bond measure are severable.

ABBREVIATED FORM OF BOND MEASURE

To improve local schools with funds that cannot be taken by the State, shall Woodland Joint Unified School District's measure to remodel/ create Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Mathematics classrooms; and replace aging roofs, wiring, heating/ cooling systems be adopted authorizing \$160 million of bonds with legal rates, levies averaging below \$58 assessed valuation (raising \$9 million annually) while bonds are outstanding, annual audits, citizen oversight, full public disclosure of spending and no funds for administrator salaries or benefits?

**TAX RATE STATEMENT REGARDING PROPOSED
\$160 MILLION
WOODLAND JOINT UNIFIED SCHOOL DISTRICT
GENERAL OBLIGATION BONDS**

An election will be held in the Woodland Joint Unified School District (the "District") on November 5, 2024, to authorize the sale of up to \$160 million in bonds of the District to finance school facilities as described in the measure. If such bonds are authorized and sold, principal and interest on the bonds will be payable only from the proceeds of ad valorem tax levies made upon the taxable property in the District. The following information is provided in compliance with Sections 9400-9404 of the Elections Code of the State of California. Such information is based upon the best estimates and projections presently available from official sources, upon experience within the District, and other demonstrable factors.

Based upon the foregoing and projections of the District's assessed valuation, the following information is provided:

1. The best estimate of the average annual tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue over the entire duration of the bond debt service, based on a projection of assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$57.35 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (or \$0.05735 per \$100 of assessed valuation). The final fiscal year in which the tax is anticipated to be collected is 2051-52
2. The best estimate of the highest tax rate which would be required to be levied to fund this bond issue, based on a projection of assessed valuations available at the time of filing of this statement, is \$60.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (or \$0.060 per \$100 of assessed valuation). It is estimated that such rate would be levied starting in fiscal year 2025-26 through 2049-50.
3. The best estimate of the total debt service, including the principal and interest, that would be required to be repaid if all the bonds are issued and sold is approximately \$275.5 million.

Voters should note the estimated tax rate is based on the assessed value (not market value) of taxable property on the official tax rolls of the counties. In addition, taxpayers eligible for a property tax exemption, such as the homeowner's exemption, will be taxed at a lower effective tax rate than described above. Property owners should consult their own property tax bills and tax advisors to determine their property's assessed value and any applicable tax exemptions.

The attention of all voters is directed to the fact that the foregoing information is based upon projections and estimates only, which amounts are not maximum amounts and are not binding upon the District. The actual debt service, tax rates and the years in which they will apply may vary from those used to provide the estimates set forth above, due to factors such as variations in the timing of bond sales, the par amount of bonds sold and market interest rates available at the time of each sale, actual assessed valuations over the term of the bonds, and other factors. The date and amount of bonds sold at any given time will be determined by the District based on the need for project funds and other considerations. The actual interest rates at which the bonds will be sold will depend on conditions in the bond market at the time of sale. Actual future assessed valuations will depend upon the amount



and value of taxable property within the District as determined by the Assessors of the Counties in the annual assessment and the equalization process.

IMPARTIAL ANALYSIS BY YOLO COUNTY COUNSEL

Upon approval of 55 percent of the votes cast by voters in an election and subject to specified accountability measures, California law permits school districts to issue bonds, secured by the levy of ad valorem property taxes on property within a district, for the purpose of construction, reconstruction, rehabilitation, or replacement of school facilities, including the furnishing and equipping of school facilities, or the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities.

The Board of Trustees (Board) of Woodland Joint Unified School District (District) proposes issuing bonds in the maximum principal amount of \$160,000,000, bearing interest at legal rates and with maturity dates within the legal limits. As identified in the ballot measure, bond proceeds may be used on the construction, modernization, reconstruction, rehabilitation, replacement, equipping, furnishing or otherwise improvement of school facilities of the District. Bond proceeds may also be utilized for the acquisition or lease of real property for school facilities. A complete list of projects and allowed expenditures is included within the full text of the Measure. The Board has certified that it has evaluated safety, class size reduction, enrollment growth, and information technology needs in developing its Project List. Inclusion of a project on the Project List does not guarantee the project will be funded or completed. The District may only use the bond proceeds for the purposes identified in the Measure.

Proceeds of school district bond measures cannot be used for teacher and administrator salaries or other school operating expenses in compliance with California Constitution Article XIII A, Section 1(b)(3) and requires independent annual performance and financial audits. State law requires the establishment of an independent citizens' oversight committee for ensuring that bond proceeds are properly expended.

Information regarding the estimated tax rate to repay these bonds is found in the "Tax Rate Statement" prepared by the District. The District's stated best estimate of the highest tax rate to be levied to fund the proposed bonds is \$60.00 per \$100,000 of assessed valuation (or \$0.060 per \$100 of assessed valuation) based on a projection of assessed valuations available at the time of filing the tax rate statement of the Measure. The District's resolution authorizing the sale and issuance of bonds does not include information about any other District debt obligations that may exist. The projected tax rate is a best estimate and projections from official sources including upon experience within the District. The actual tax rate necessary to pay the Bond Measure may vary depending on factors identified in the Tax Rate Statement. Taxpayers eligible for a property tax exemption will be taxed at a lower effective tax rate than described above.



A “yes” vote is a vote to authorize the issuance of the bonds in the amount of \$160,000,000 to be secured by the levy of ad valorem property taxes on property located within the District.

A “no” vote is a vote to not authorize the issuance of the bonds.

Measure P was placed on the ballot by the Board.

What You Should Know About Fentanyl

Fentanyl is a powerful synthetic opioid. Prescription fentanyl is safe when taken as prescribed by a doctor to treat severe pain. However, illicitly manufactured fentanyl is also distributed through illegal drug markets.

Illegally manufactured fentanyl is often added to other substances like counterfeit (fake) pills, heroin, cocaine and methamphetamine. Even in small doses, fentanyl exposure can cause a fatal overdose. Naloxone is a medication that can reverse an overdose from opioids — including fentanyl. Naloxone is available daily, without a prescription at Adventist—Rideout Hospital and AEGIS.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention:

- Fentanyl is up to 50 times stronger than heroin and 100 times stronger than morphine.
- More than 150 people die every day in the U.S. from overdoses related to synthetic opioids like fentanyl.

Signs of overdose:

- Small, constricted “pinpoint” pupils
- Face is extremely pale and feels cold or clammy to the touch
- Body goes limp
- Fingernails or lips have a purple or blue color
- Vomiting or making gurgling noises
- Cannot be awakened or unable to speak
- Breathing or heartbeat slows or stops

How to save a life:

1. Call 911 right away
2. Try to wake the person up
3. Give naloxone, if available
4. Begin rescue breathing or CPR
5. Turn the person on their side to prevent choking
6. Stay with the person until emergency services arrive

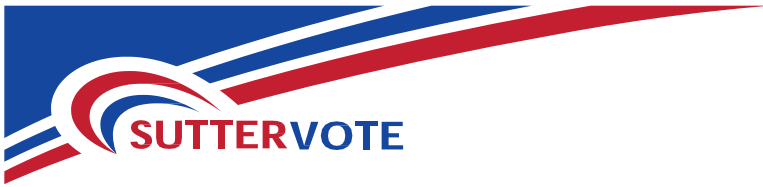
